## Georgia emissions test rules

In Georgia all vehicles must go through safety inspection once a year. In some parts of the state this safety inspection includes emissions inspection, or otherwise known as "smog" inspection once a year. Diesel-powered vehicles, motor homes and recreational vehicles (RVs) are exempt from smog checks. Motorcycles are also not undergoing emissions testing. Also exempt are antique or collector vehicles (older than 1993), and vehicles include alternative fuel vehicles (for example, vehicles running on electricity, hydrogen, propane or natural gas). This does not include hybrids like Toyota Prius, Ford Escape, etc. Bi-fueled vehicles operating on gasoline must always be tested for emissions is not required in entirety of State of Georgia. To complete your vehicle safety inspection visit your nearest licensed inspection station with your ID, vehicle registration and proof of insurance, and payment fee (up to \$25). Vehicles 1996 and newer can be tested at any licensed inspection station. Some stations may not be able to test vehicles manufactured prior to 1996. Emissions testing in Georgia is done through OBD (On-Board Diagnostics) test. OBD test includes reading your vehicle's built-in computer system for emissions control performance history. Further inspection to verify an adequate seal exists, and a visual inspection of the catalytic converter to check for tampering or removal. Assuming your vehicle passes both safety and smog inspections, you will receive documentation required for your vehicle registration or registration or registration renewal. You will also receive a windshield sticker serving as proof. What happens is emissions testing fails? Failing emissions testing means your vehicle will have to be repaired and re-tested before you can pass the safety inspection. If your vehicle does not meet emissions or smog standards set by Georgia laws, you can apply for a waiver after having your vehicle repaired. Motorists must spend at least \$879 for emissions inspection after these repairs you can request a repair waiver. Ensure you find a emissions repair facility with a valid business license to complete any emissions repairs. When repairing in non-recognized repair stations labor costs will not be contributed to waiver sequirements, only vehicle parts. Emission inspection waivers are issued to owners of years of age, driving less than 5,000 miles per year, and driving a 2007 or older model vehicle can apply for a Senior Exemption. Out-of-Area Extensions can be issued to residents who are temporarily located outside the 13 Georgia counties which have smog tests. These extensions are valid for a maximum of 1 year and can be given to military personnel, or residents with school or business obligations. The one-year inspection validation is good only for the same owner. Salvaged Vehicles in Georgia A salvaged vehicle must be towed to a state-approved inspection station in order to be inspected. If after failing a retest, the owner may be eligible to receive a repair waiver. The state of Georgia takes into consideration how old your vehicle is as well as the emissions components available and installed on it when the state created its emissions testing standards. Vehicle owner takes longer than 30 days to get a vehicle retested then they must pay the testing fee again. In order to get a Repair Waiver, the vehicle owner must meet the following requirements: The initial inspection cannot be more than one year old (12 months) or associated with a previous Repair Waiver or registration renewal. Emission-related repairs must meet or exceed an \$855 Repair Waiver limit amount. The retested vehicle must show improvement in all areas it failed on, as well as pass all areas it passed on in the first test. Repair receipt is 60 days before or after the corresponding failed emissions test. Repair receipts must be from a repair facility possessing a valid business license. All emission-related repairs, including a diagnostic analysis, parts, and labor can be used toward the Repair Waiver limit amount. If required, the repair facility's business license must be obtainable. If the owner performs the emissions-related repairs on the vehicle, only the cost of parts will be considered toward the Repair Waiver limit amount. Vehicle owners can get their vehicles tested at any service station with a sign indicating they do vehicle testing. Stations with signs displayed stating "1996 and newer" only test vehicles made in the 1996 model year or newer. Stations with the "All Vehicles Welcome" sign test 1995 and older model year vehicles as well as 1996 and newer vehicles.
