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## Georgia emissions test rules

In Georgia all vehicles must go through safety inspection once a year. In some parts of the state this safety inspection includes emissions inspection, or otherwise known as "smog" inspection. The following article will give you the basics of smog laws in Georgia. Below you can find out how smog checks are performed in the state of Georgia, and which vehicles are exempt from smog laws. Georgia requires emissions or smog testing for gasoline-powered vehicles older than 3 years and newer than 1993, or light duty trucks lighter than 8,500 pounds. Emissions testing is only done in the following counties: Cherokee, Clayton, Cobb, Coweta, DeKalb, Fayette, Forsyth, Fulton, Gwinnett, Henry, Paulding, and Rockdale. When are vehicle emissions inspected? All vehicles registered in GA must be tested annually prior to registration date, which is the vehicle owner's birthday. It is recommended to test your vehicle 4-6 weeks prior to registration date to give you ample time to perform necessary repairs if required. All emission tests are valid for 1 year or one registration renewal. If your vehicle qualifies, you will need to perform emissions testing every year before you can renew your registration. Which vehicles require emissions testing? In Georgia, your vehicle requires emissions testing if: It is older than 3 years, but manufactured in or after 1993 If it runs on gasoline If it weighs less than 8,500 lbs If you're moving residence to Georgia into a county which requires car emissions tests, you will need to have your vehicle inspected and registered within 30 days. Inspections completed in other states will not be valid in Georgia. Which vehicles are exempt from smog testing? Diesel-powered vehicles, motor homes and recreational vehicles (RVs) are exempt from smog checks. Motorcycles are also not undergoing emissions testing. Also exempt are antique or collector vehicles (older than 1993), and vehicles with a gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR) of more than 8,500 pounds. Furthermore, exempt vehicles include alternative fuel vehicles (for example, vehicles running on electricity, hydrogen, propane or natural gas). This does not include hybrids like Toyota Prius, Ford Escape, etc. Bi-fueled vehicles operating on gasoline must always be tested for emissions. Which counties or areas require smog test? Testing for vehicle emissions is not required in entirety of State of Georgia. Only the following 13 counties require smog tests for eligible vehicles: Cherokee Clayton Cobb Coweta DeKalb Douglas Fayette Forsyth Fulton Gwinnett Henry Paulding Rockdale Vehicle sellers located in any of these counties must ensure a vehicle has a valid Georgia Vehicle Emission Inspection Report (VIR) at the time of sale, however sellers are not required to provide a hard-copy of the VIR to buyers. You can view VIR records online here. In case you purchased a vehicle without a valid Vehicle Emissions Inspection Report you can file a complaint against the seller via this Used Vehicle Sale Complaint Form (pdf file). How emissions testing works? To complete your vehicle safety inspection visit your nearest licensed inspection station with your ID, vehicle registration and proof of insurance, and payment fee (up to \$25). Vehicles 1996 and newer can be tested at any licensed inspection station. Some stations may not be able to test vehicles manufactured prior to 1996. Emissions testing in Georgia is done through OBD (On-Board Diagnostics) test. OBD test includes reading your vehicle's built-in computer system for emissions control performance history. Further inspections include a fuel cap inspection to verify an adequate seal exists, and a visual inspection of the catalytic converter to check for tampering or removal. Assuming your vehicle passes both safety and smog inspections, you will receive documentation required for your vehicle registration or registration renewal. You will also receive a windshield sticker serving as proof. What happens is emissions testing fails? Failing emissions testing means your vehicle will have to be repaired and re-tested before you can pass the safety inspection. If your vehicle does not meet emissions or smog standards set by Georgia laws, you can apply for a waiver after having your vehicle repaired. Motorists must spend at least \$879 for emissions-related repairs to qualify for a repair waiver. If your vehicle still doesn't pass emissions inspection after these repairs you can request a repair waiver. Ensure you find a emissions repair facility with a valid business license to complete any emissions repairs. When repairing in non-recognized repair stations labor costs will not be contributed to waiver requirements, only vehicle parts. Emission inspection waivers Repair waivers are issued to owners of vehicles that fail testing after having spent a minimum of \$879 for emission-related repairs. Georgia residents over 65 years of age, driving less than 5,000 miles per year, and driving a 2007 or older model vehicle can apply for a Senior Exemption. Out-of-Area Extensions can be issued to residents who are temporarily located outside the 13 Georgia counties which have smog tests. These extensions are valid for a maximum of 1 year and can be given to military personnel, or residents with school or business obligations. Emissions testing fee is added to safety inspection fee. This fee is typically no higher than \$25, but the exact amount depends on your county. When you pass safety and emissions inspection, don't forget to keep your receipt. This will serve as proof of your completed inspection and you may require it at a later date. Criteria for Emissions Testing in Georgia Georgia's emissions testing requirements are managed by the Georgia Clean Air Force (GCAF), which oversees the Vehicle Emissions Inspection and Maintenance (I/M) Program. Vehicles registered in 13 metro Atlanta counties, including Fulton, DeKalb, Gwinnett, and Cobb, must undergo annual testing. This applies to gasoline-powered cars and light-duty trucks between three and 25 years old. The process involves an On-Board Diagnostics (OBD) test for vehicles manufactured in 1996 or later, and potentially a tailpipe test for older models. The cost is capped at \$25 to ensure affordability. Penalties for Non-Compliance Failure to comply with emissions testing requirements can result in significant consequences. Vehicles that fail the test or skip inspection cannot be registered, preventing license plate renewal and legal operation on public roads. Operating such a vehicle may lead to fines up to \$100, excluding court costs or administrative fees. These penalties stress the importance of adhering to the testing schedule. Exemptions and Special Cases Georgia's emissions laws include specific exemptions. Vehicles three years old or newer are exempt due to their advanced emissions control systems. Alternative fuel vehicles, including those powered by electricity, natural gas, or propane, are also exempt, aligning with the state's environmental goals. Additionally, vehicles 25 years or older are exempt, recognizing their limited road use and cultural significance as classic cars. A Repair Waiver may be granted if a vehicle fails the test and the owner has spent at least \$918 on emissions-related repairs, provided proper documentation is submitted to the GCAF. Legal Defenses and Appeals Vehicle owners have options to address issues with emissions testing. Errors, such as faulty equipment during the test, can be challenged by requesting a re-test. If a waiver or exemption is denied, owners can file an appeal with the Georgia Department of Revenue by submitting a formal request and supporting documentation. All gasoline cars and light-duty trucks (weighing 8,500 lbs or less) made between the 1994 - 2014 model years must get a vehicle emissions test. The State of Georgia created its Inspection and Maintenance (I/M) program in 1996 after the implementation of the Federal Clean - Air Act and the designation of the 13 counties in and around the Atlanta metropolitan area by the Federal government as "non-attainment areas" for meeting the Clean-Air Act's regulatory requirements. Requirements to Pass the Georgia Smog Check If a vehicle owner registers a gasoline car or light-duty truck (weighing 8,500 lbs or less) made in the 1994 - 2014 model years in one of the following counties, it must get a vehicle emissions test: Once passed, Georgia vehicle owners do not need to complete another emissions inspection for 1 year (or one registration renewal cycle). The one-year inspection validation is good only for the same owner. The vehicle must be tested every year during the vehicle's scheduled registration renewal due date - usually on the vehicle owner's birthday. Salvaged Vehicles in Georgia A salvaged vehicle must be towed to a state-approved inspection station in order to be inspected. The owner must provide photos of the original, wrecked condition of the vehicle before they made any repairs to the vehicle as well as: a completed tag and title application, a T022 Request for Inspection of Rebuilt Motor Vehicle Form, a Labor and Parts Certification, a Form T-129, and payment for the inspection. Smog Check Exemptions for Georgia Drivers Georgia exempts certain vehicles from testing. If your vehicle falls under one of these categories it does not need to be tested: Vehicles weighing greater than 8,500 pounds Diesel or alternative fuel vehicles (battery electric, propane, natural gas, and hydrogen) Vehicles designated as Antique or Collector vehicles Motorcycles, recreational vehicles (RVs) and motorhomes Vehicles made in a model year 25 years old or older than the current test cycle Hybrid vehicles such as Ford Escape, Honda Insight, Honda Civic, Honda Accord, Lexus RX, Mercury Mariner, Toyota Highlander, and Toyota Prius are not considered alternative-fuel vehicles and do require testing. Also, bi-fuel vehicles that operate on an 85% ethanol/gasoline blend, or bi-fuel vehicle's that can operate on all propane or natural gas and gasoline, must be emissions tested while using 100% gasoline. This testing requirement is still enforced even if the owner does not fuel the vehicle with gasoline regularly. If a Georgia vehicle owner who is 65 years or older, and meets the following criteria can apply and receive a Georgia Senior Exemption: Owns a vehicle made in a model year at least 10 years ago or older The vehicle's odometer is not malfunctioning and the owner does not drive the vehicle more than 5,000 miles a year The vehicle owner applying for the Senior Exemption is the primary vehicle owner. (The applicant's name is the first name listed on the title/registration of the vehicle) To apply for a senior exemption, the applicant must submit the following documents to a Georgia Clean Air Force Customer Service Center or select State of Georgia Tag Offices: Completed Senior Exemption Application Form Proof of Age (Driver's license, Birth Certificate, or Passport) Proof of Car Ownership (Ex: A Georgia Car Title, Registration, or Renewal notice) Non-Conforming Status for Georgia Registered Vehicles Georgia also has a special status for certain vehicles called, "Non-Conforming Status." If the following vehicles meet this status, they may have alternative rules for meeting Georgia's testing requirements depending on the vehicle's mechanical configuration or model year: Kit Cars - All kit cars that did not get classified as Non-Conforming before December 31, 1998, or the owner registered the kit car in one of the 13 counties where vehicles must pass an emissions inspection after December 31, 1998 must have all the emissions equipment installed that's listed on the vehicle's registration card to pass a test. Hot Rods - assembled or modified after December 31, 1998, can not receive Non-Conforming status. Grey Market Vehicles - As long as the vehicle's model year is no later than 1985 the owner may apply for Non-Conforming status if the owner brought the vehicle into one of the 13 counties requiring vehicle emissions testing after December 31, 1998. Vehicles with Obsolete Parts - In order for a vehicle to meet Georgia emissions requirements must get mechanical components replaced and the owner is unable to locate or the part is no longer manufactured, the owner can apply for Non-Conforming status. Georgia vehicle inspection personnel will require the owner to check local salvage yards, parts shops, and also online. If Georgia vehicle inspection personnel are able to locate the part, the Non-Conforming status will not be granted to the vehicle. Smog Check Extensions for Georgia Drivers If a vehicle owner has a registered Georgia vehicle and is outside of a reasonable driving distance of one of the 13 counties requiring testing, they may be eligible for a Georgia out-of-area extension. Vehicle owners with vehicles registered in one of the covered counties for emissions testing who are residing in another county may still have to get their vehicle tested if they are out-of-town during the scheduled testing time. The general rule is if a vehicle owner currently lives in a county with a county seat within 100 miles of the covered county they have a residence, then they can not get an out-of-area extension for their vehicle. If a resident of one of the 13 covered counties has a motor vehicle requiring testing, and they are residing in one of the following out-of-state counties for school, business, or for military service they must get their vehicle tested: Alabama Tennessee North Carolina South Carolina Cherokee Etowah DeKalb Cleburne Randolph Calhoun Talladega Chambers Lee Clay Russell Tallapoosa Macon County Sesss Bradley Polk Hamilton Cherokee Clay Macon Oconee Anderson Georgia validates out-of-area extensions for one year. Vehicle owners must get these extensions renewed every year and must get their vehicles tested when they return to their county of residence in or around the city of Atlanta metro area. Emissions inspection certifications from other states cannot be used as proof of an emissions inspections in the State of Georgia. However, they can be used as proof for receiving an out-of-area extension. When applying for an out-of-area extension, the following documents must be submitted: Completed Out-of-Area Exemption application. Proof the applicant owns the vehicle - This can be done by the applicant providing the vehicle's registration, renewal notice, or a copy of the vehicle's title. Verification that a Georgia member is out of the area through the submission of the following completed documents. Out-of-Area Exemption for Business - A completed Georgia Vehicle Inspection Form or a letter or company letterhead verifying the applicant's employment with the organization and the location they will be working. Within the previous year, the applicant must check local salvage yards, parts shops, and also online. 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
