SALT LAKE CITY — Tonight, in consultation with the Sandhurst Fire incident commander, the Salt Lake City Police Department lifted all evacuation orders previously associated with the Sandhurst Fire. After strong efforts by firefighting resources on the Sandhurst Fire, containment has been reached on the southern perimeter. Fire managers feel confident the fire will not progress further towards the community. Therefore, they have recommended lifting the evacuations for the fire. This includes the mandatory evacuation order for residents north of Dorchester Drive, including Twickenham Drive and the voluntary evacuation of the neighborhood west of East Capitol Boulevard and east of Victory Road. Residents may re-enter but are asked to follow @utahwildfire for incident updates (. This is a conditional re-entry. The Sandhurst Fire incident command team is requesting residents, once returned, to remain prepared to evacuate, if needed. The Sandhurst Fire incident management team is drafting conditions under which the evacuation order would be re-instated. The incident command team remains on the fire and will continue efforts to increase containment. All updates on fire activity and size, will be released by the U.S. Forest Service and the Sandhurst Fire incident command. Both the Salt Lake City Police Department and the Sandhurst Fire incident command team continue to ask non-residents to avoid the area. This will ease access for residents, but mostly avoid inhibiting firefighting resources. Trail closures for Ensign Peak, Tunnel Springs, and the section of the Bonneville Shoreline Trail nearest the fire remain in effect. Additional localized park closures may remain in effect, including City Creek Canyon, as determined by the Salt Lake City Department of Public Utilities to assist with firefighting efforts. A bus bridge is being utilized for those needing transit. Firefighters were working to save homes about about 1.2 miles (1.9 kilometers) up East Capitol Boulevard, and evacuees were offered a space in the capitol complex where they could escape the heat."With the heat, as well as the wind direction and just the temperatures out here and the fuel moisture, it's kind of a recipe that we could have a quickly running fire," Division Chief Bob Silverthorne of the Salt Lake City Fire Department said at a Saturday news briefing.The first fire crew was dispatched around 4:30 p.m. Saturday and more than six different emergency agencies joined the effort, Silverthorne said. Police officers knocked on doors to warn homeowners after the fire department ordered a mandatory evacuation for an area of 40 homes on Sandhurst Drive, north of Dorchester Drive. A voluntary evacuation was ordered Saturday along East Capitol. There were no immediate reports of injuries or structure damage, he said. Officials did not know the exact cause or origin of the brush fire, which grew to about 200 acres. By Sunday morning, the Utah Fire Info website listed the blaze as human-caused, and zero-percent contained. Hot and dry conditions were expected to continue Sunday.Overall, Utah has had 585 fires burning over 40,000 acres so far this wildfire season, and 421 of them have been human-caused, the website says. As of Monday afternoon, the fire size remained at an estimated 204 acres, but was now 82 percent containment. There was no fire movement overnight, with crews on scene to secure the wildfire's perimeter in an effort to gain more containment. "After strong efforts by firefighting resources on the Sandhurst Fire, containment has been reached on the southern perimeter. Fire managers feel confident the fire will not progress further towards the community," Salt Lake City Police said in the announcement, released at 10 p.m. Officials are still asking non-residents to avoid the area. While evacuations have been lifted, the following trails remain closed:Ensign Peak TrailCity Creek Trail (North of Bonneville Boulevard)Tunnel Springs TrailSections of Bonneville Shoreline TrailAround 40 houses were evacuated, with the fire about a half-mile away. And although the evacuation orders have been lifted, SLCPD warns residents in the area to stay on alert and be prepared to evacuate again if necessary. The wildfire broke out Saturday afternoon near Ensign Peak, a popular location overlooking the city above the Utah State Capitol. Late Saturday, the fire was also threatening radio towers on the mountain, which remains a concern. "The fact that it was detected allowed the fire department and the utility to take the appropriate action to stop the flow of gas."Hall emphasized that while this incident did not cause a major disaster, Enbridge should thoroughly inspect the gas line infrastructure."They need to look at the integrity of the line and make sure that there weren't any pre-existing leaks," Hall said. "And if there were pre-existing leaks, they should be doing a leak survey in that area."KUTV 2News reached out to Enbridge for comment, but a spokesperson was unavailable. Instead, they sent a statement:On April 27, Enbridge Gas was called to respond to a fire in the area of 3400 S and West Temple in South Salt Lake. Upon arrival, it was determined that a fallen power line had damaged the natural gas line, which fueled the resulting fire.Working safely alongside the local fire department, Rocky Mountain Power, and other emergency response officials, Enbridge crews were able to secure the line around 9 p.m., and began making repairs to the damaged pipeline.To ensure public safety, a specified area near the incident was evacuated. Road closures were implemented to isolate the escaping natural gas and contain the fire.As of early this morning, gas was restored to normal operating conditions and customers were able to return to their homes. Crews have been able to relight all homes and businesses to which they were able gain access. Officials cautioned that residents needed to remain ready to evacuate, with the fire only partially under control as of Monday morning.The blaze ignited Saturday and grew to about 200 acres (80 hectares), officials said. Helicopters and planes dropped buckets over the flames as ground crews tried to contain the fire on Ensign Peak.Police officers knocked on doors to warn homeowners after the fire department ordered a mandatory evacuation for an area of 40 homes on Sandhurst Drive, north of Dorchester Drive. A voluntary evacuation was ordered Saturday along East Capitol. There were no immediate reports of injuries or structure damage, he said.Officials said fire crews resumed work early Monday in hopes of gaining ground on the blaze before high temperatures return in the afternoon. Prev Next SALT LAKE CITY — Juan Plazola didn't wake up to the sound of his regular alarm clock on Tuesday, instead getting a call from his mother. "She called me, I was asleep," he said, "she woke me up out of my sleep."Plazola's mom called her son just after running out of a burning building in Salt Lake City, which was her place of work. Most of the Salt Lake Valley saw a massive plume of smoke arise from the downtown area as the snack factory housed in the old Golden Dragon restaurant was destroyed by fire. "Three alarms on this, which give us about 14 heavy apparatus on scene," said Salt Lake City Fire Department Capt. Brent Hancuff, who was on the scene. "We have approximately 60 firefighter personnel here fighting this fire." After a few hours, firefighters were able to put out the flames, and no one was injured. Now, his mother and everyone else who worked at the business are out of work. "She's a little sad, she's a little emotional," Plazola shared. "She's alright though."Veronica Bojorquez, the owner of Luna Coffee and Crystals nearby, feels for her neighboring small business.
