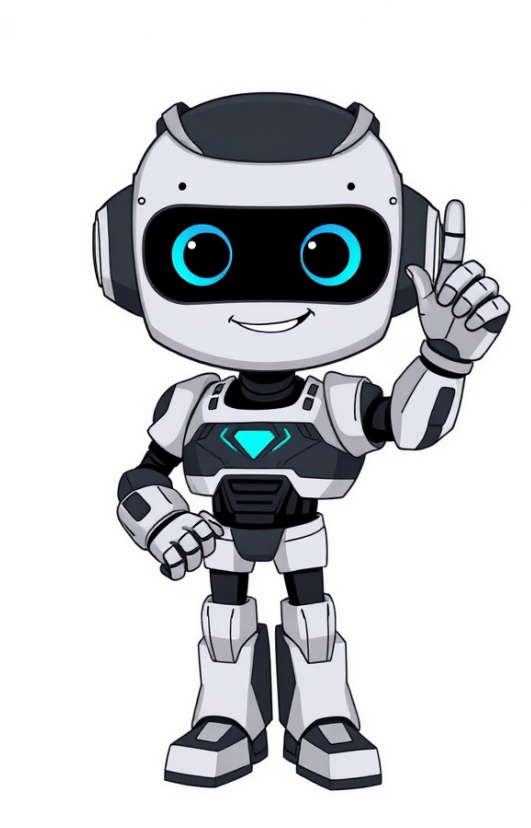

The Disease Outbreak News (DONs) report provides information on confirmed acute public health events or potential events of concern, according to International Health Regulations (2005). The DONs report is published regularly, providing up-to-date information on public health events that may affect international travel or trade. The report includes data on unknown causes with significant or potential international health concerns, known causes with demonstrated ability to cause serious public health impact, and high public concern that may disrupt required public health interventions.
