"Preschool" is the category for children aged 2 to 4 years of age (Infants: 0-1 year of age & Toddlers: 1-2 years of age). A preschool teacher provides care to children aged 2–4 years old within unlicensed childcare centres, licensed childcare centres, home based child care and after school programs. Attendance for children in Preschool is not mandated as it is not a publicly funded educational program accessible to all. There are costs involved and usually sought after by working parents until the child reaches school age.
