Past perfect tense irregular verbs

Irregular verbs in English don't follow the usual -ed ending rule to form past tense. Examples include steal (stole), make (made), and break (broke). To use tenses like simple past, present perfect, or past perfect correctly, you need to know how irregular verbs change their forms. In simple past, only affirmative sentences use the past form: "I made a cake." But with negative or question sentences, the past participle is used: "I didn't make a cake" or "Did I make the cake?" This rule applies to both simple and present perfect tenses. When asking yes/no questions, place "had" before the subject and past participle: Had Silverfinger taken the pill? Don't forget common contractions such as I'd for "I had."
