Your Brain Can Learn Things "Unconsciously" The human brain is truly amazing. It has the ability to automatically learn complicated things, without conscious effort. Let me explain this with a scientific study.
In this study, people were asked to press keys on a keyboard based on what appeared in the first box, they had to press the X key. If the sign appeared in the second, third, or fourth box, they had to press C,
B, or N respectively. (They had to do this as fast as possible.) But there's a secret to this experiment. The X sign may appear in this order: 4, 2, 1, 3, 3, 4, 1, 2, 3, 2, 1, 2, 4, 4, 1, 3. (The numbers 1 to 4 represent the four boxes.) So the sign appeared in
