South Africa's President Ramaphosa has 81 trained bodyguards watching over and protect him every day. Compared to the roughly 369 South Africans assigned to be kept safe by every 'normal' police officer, that's quite a lot of people watching one person.However, The South African reports the guards watch over more than just the president.There is also the Presidential Protection Unit. This unit is meant to keep watch over senior government officials. They also watch over President Ramaphosa's wife.There are more than 1 300 trained protection officers in the Presidential Protection Unit. It cost South African taxpayers R693 million last year.President Ramaphosa and many dignitaries enjoy serious protection wherever they travel.READ ALSO: SAs new blade runner: Tebogo Mofokeng, 18, runs in international raceGeneral Khehla Sithole stated that keeping dignitaries safe at all times is serious business. The Presidential Protection Unit is watching over 17 VIPs at this time. Briefly.co.za learned that depending on who a bodyguard is protecting, he (or she) could earn more than R70 000 a month. Given this estimate, the 81 bodyguards could easily cost South African taxpayers more than R500 000 a month.Zakhele Mbhele of the Democratic Alliance was not impressed with the news that the president and dignitaries are enjoying such high levels of protection.This is a blatant example of how the lives of the elite matter more to the ANC government than ordinary citizens lives. A person working as a Security Guard in South Africa typically earns around 9,340 ZAR per month. Salaries range from 4,860 ZAR (lowest) to 14,300 ZAR (highest). Security Guard Salary Comparison by Years of Experience How does experience and age affect your pay? The experience level is the most important factor in determining the salary. Naturally the more years of experience the higher your wage. We broke down Security Guard salaries by experience level and this is what we found. A Security Guard with less than two years of experience makes approximately 5,520 ZAR per month. While someone with an experience level between two and five years is expected to earn 7,400 ZAR per month, 34% more than someone with less than two years experience. Moving forward, an experience level between five and ten years lands a salary of 9,620 ZAR per month, 30% more than someone with two to five years of experience. Additionally, Security Guard(s) whose expertise span anywhere between ten and fifteen years get a salary equivalent to 11,600 ZAR per month, 21% more than someone with five to ten years of experience. The South African news reported in 2019 that Ramaphosa earns almost 20 times more than the average wage of a South African.The research was conducted by Adzuna research team wherein they compared the annual salaries of leaders from 45 nations with the average income of their population and Ramaphosa took the top spot, earning 19 times more than the common person.The average wage for a South African over a 12-month period is R181 000, showing just how far the gap is between the elite and the working classes. Ramaphosa has shown acts of generosity wherein he donated part of his salary to make a difference and help curb the spread of Covid-19.In April 2020, he announced a one-third salary cut for himself, the Deputy President, Ministers, their deputies, and Premiers for a period of three months.The money was donated to the Solidarity Fund that was set up to fight the coronavirus pandemic.
