It will be updated alongside the Eastern Time airing of the show, beginning at about 8:30 PM Eastern. This game’s Jeopardy Masters contestants: Mattea Roach, a writer & podcast host from Toronto, Ontario, Canada (25-13, 1 point) James Holzhauer, the self-described “final boss” of Jeopardy! from Las Vegas, Nevada (47-6, 4 points) Victoria Groce, a writer & television personality from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania (7-2, 6 points) Victoria is dominating the competition with her strong buzzer skills and wins. She has two victories so far and needs to win this match to mathematically clinch a spot in the semifinals. Mattea will need to improve her buzzer timing against Victoria and James, who are both known for their exceptional skills. My friends over at Geeks Who Drink have introduced a daily trivia game—Thrice! Existing to make daily clever trivia content accessible to a wide audience, it’s a daily challenge that tries to get you to the answer via three separate clues. You can find game-by-game stats here at The Jeopardy Fan of all 17 players, now including Adriana Harmeyer, that have won 10 or more games on Jeopardy! In the latest episode of Jeopardy!, Victoria Groce took an early lead, with James Holzhauer and Mattea Roach close behind. After a missed Daily Double, James managed to tie with Mattea for second place, but Victoria maintained her significant advantage. In the Double Jeopardy round, both Victoria and James passed the 20-correct-response mark, earning them True Daily Doubles. However, this round was not as one-sided as expected, with James getting within 50% of Victoria’s score going into Final. The Final Jeopardy category was “Famous Last Words,” and the clue revealed that Cardinal Wolsey made his last confession in 1530, wishing he had served God as diligently as he did the King. Unfortunately for James, this was a Triple Stumper, with only Victoria correctly responding. As a result, Victoria picked up three more points, while James earned only one point. Mattea’s score remained unchanged at zero. In terms of overall standings, Victoria takes the lead in Jeopardy! Masters, followed closely by Yogesh Raut and James. The chances of each player winning the tournament are as follows: James has a 27.6% chance, Victoria has a 25.4%, Yogesh has a 22.6%, Matt Amodio has an 11% chance, Amy Schneider has an 8.9% chance, and Mattea has a 4.6% chance. The game statistics reveal that James was efficient in selecting clues before Daily Doubles were found, but his rebound attempts on Final Jeopardy were unsuccessful. Overall, Victoria’s score of 16,400 Coryat suggests she will need to maintain her momentum if she wants to take home the title. Victoria Groce Victoria: Standard cover bet over James is \$5,601. Actual bet: \$5,601 James: If Victoria is incorrect and bets to cover, she falls to \$23,999. Thus, you should bet at least \$6,400. I would limit my bet in this situation to \$10,599, as that forces Mattea to be correct to pass you. Actual bet: \$6,400 Mattea: You’re probably going to be in a position where James has to be incorrect and you correct to take a match point. Thus, you might as well go all in. Actual bet: \$7,000 The first Jeopardy! Masters competition featured James Holzhauer, who won 32 straight games in 2019 and holds the fourth-longest winning streak and second-largest cash winnings. He also won the 2019 Tournament of Champions and was runner-up in The Greatest of All Time tournament. Mattea Roach, a Canadian, won 23 straight games in 2022 and is the first Canadian to compete in Jeopardy! Masters. Matt Amodio won 38 straight games between July and October 2021, holding the third-longest winning streak and third-highest cash winnings. Amy Schneider won 40 straight games between November 2021 and January 2022, taking home the second-longest winning streak and fourth-largest cash winnings. Sam Buttrey, who won the 2021 Professors Tournament, placed third in the 2022 Tournament of Champions. The second Jeopardy! Masters competition included Victoria Groce, who won one game in September 2005, defeating David Madden. Yogesh Raut won three straight games in January 2023 and qualified as the 2024 Tournament of Champions winner. James Holzhauer qualified as the 2023 Masters champion, while Amy Schneider received a wildcard invitation after finishing second in the Jeopardy! Invitational Tournament. Mattea Roach and Matt Amodio qualified as runners-up and third-place finalists, respectively. The top two finalists from the second competition, Groce and Raut, were invited to the season three Masters competition. The nine contestants competing in the third Jeopardy! Masters include Victoria Groce, who won the 2024 Masters championship; Yogesh Raut, the runner-up; Neellesh Vinjamuri, a 3-game champion; Matt Amodio, the winner of the 2025 Jeopardy! Invitational Tournament; and Juveria Zaheer, the first contestant to win both the Second Chance competition and Champions Wildcard. Held record for highest one-day winnings of \$77,000 from Sep 14, 2010 to Apr 9, 2019. Winner of 2011 Tournament of Champions and 3rd place finalist in Battle of the Decades. Co-runner-up in 2025 Jeopardy! Invitational Tournament with total winnings of \$606,200. Isaac Hirsch is a 9-game champion and co-runner-up in 2025 Tournament of Champions with \$293,390 in total winnings. Adriana Harmeyer is a 15-game champion and co-runner-up in 2025 Tournament of Champions with \$426,600 in total winnings. Brad Rutter holds the record for all-time highest money winner in Jeopardy! history, winning five regular games and retiring undefeated in 2000. He won five Jeopardy! Tournaments and was 3rd place finalist in Jeopardy! The Greatest of All Time. Rutter replaced James Holzhauer, who qualified as 2024 Masters 3rd place finalist but chose not to compete. Total winnings for Rutter are \$4,953,436. The tournament features six former Jeopardy! champions competing round-robin style, with the first season consisting of 10 hour-long episodes featuring two games each. Initially, the producers intended a pure round-robin system without eliminations but adjusted to a three-round structure prior to production. In subsequent seasons, the number of episodes was reduced, and the tournament structure was modified. Unlike traditional Jeopardy!, games in this tournament are scored in points. The producers have used Jeopardy! Masters to experiment with format variations, including revealing Daily Double locations and modifying knockout matches. Winners receive three match points, runners-up receive one, and third-place players receive none. Contestants play two games in knockouts, and the top six advance to Quarterfinals. The quarterfinals use the same format, and the four highest-ranked players move on to semifinals. The tournament consists of multiple rounds. In the early stages, contestants play each other in a round-robin format over four games, with one player sitting out each game. The top three players then move on to the finals, where they compete against each other in a two-game match. The player with the highest combined score over the two games is declared champion. The winner receives a cash prize of \$500,000, the Trebek Trophy, and an invitation to participate in future Masters competitions. In the event of a tie, the following tiebreakers are used: 1. Number of wins 2. Total correct responses (including Final Jeopardy!) 3. Cumulative scores, excluding Daily Double and Final Jeopardy! wagers 4. Cumulative scores, excluding only Final Jeopardy! wagers The contestant with the highest score in each round is qualified for the next stage, while those who are eliminated receive smaller cash prizes. In the previous seasons, James Holzhauer was crowned champion, followed by Mattea Roach and Matt Amodio. In the latest season, Victoria Groce emerged as the winner, defeating Yogesh Raut in the final round. Masters competition is set to return for Season 3, with new contestants and a new schedule. The Jeopardy! Masters series has been announced, featuring some of the show’s highest-ranked champions competing against each other in a new tournament format. The competition will take place on ABC and is expected to feature six top contestants vying for supremacy. Victoria Groce, a former Jeopardy! winner, has expressed support for a particular method of learning rock bands, which may be related to the competition. In a recent episode of Inside Jeopardy!, host Michael Davies discussed what the Jeopardy! Masters series entails. The format will involve daily doubles being rewritten based on how well contestants do in the tournament. The Jeopardy! Masters tournament has concluded its second season in 2024. The final champion was crowned on May 22, bringing an end to the competition. According to sources, the winner was among the original six players who participated in the tournament. This information is available for those who have seen the May 22 episode of the show. Given article text here Victoria Groce took home the top prize in the Jeopardy! Masters 2024 tournament, defeating reigning champion James Holzhauer and Tournament of Champions winner Yogesh Raut in the finals. Groce’s impressive performance earned her a spot as a defending champion for next year’s tournament.
