The Percy Jackson and the Olympians series comprises seventeen books, of which ten are companion books, plus five graphic novels that are adaptations of original novels, all written by Rick Riordan.[1][2][3] They center on Percy Jackson as he discovers he's a demigod, takes on missions from the Greek gods, and faces challenges to protect both the mortal and divine realms. Reading order of the Percy Jackson and the Olympians books. It's necessary to read the books in the Percy Jackson and the Olympians series in chronological order, as this reflects the progression of Percy's growth and the increasing challenges he faces in fighting ancient forces. During gym class, Percy is attacked by Laestrygonians but is saved by Tyson and Annabeth, who have returned to Camp Half-Blood after having dreams about the camp's peril. The trio travels to Camp Half-Blood and discovers its protective barriers have weakened. With Camp Half-Blood in jeopardy and Chiron falsely accused of sabotage, Percy, Annabeth, and Tyson set out on a mission to find the only remedy. The third book that should be read is The Titan's Curse. It was originally published in the United States, on May 1, 2007, by Miramax Books and Hyperion Books for Children.[8][9] In The Titan's Curse, Percy Jackson, Annabeth Chase, and Thalia Grace infiltrate West Hall boarding school in Bar Harbor, Maine, to escort siblings Bianca and Nico di Angelo to Camp Half-Blood. Their mission is successful, but Dr. Thorn captures Annabeth, prompting Artemis and her Hunters to take action. Artemis pursues a mantichore capable of destroying Mount Olympus, while the half-bloods are sent to camp by Apollo. Bianca gains immortality by joining the Hunters, complicating the group's dynamics. The fourth book that should be read is The Battle of the Labyrinth. It was originally published in the United States, on May 6, 2008, by Disney Hyperion.[10][11] In The Battle of the Labyrinth, Percy Jackson attends freshman orientation at Goode High School, where he reconnects with Rachel Elizabeth Dare, who can see through the Mist. Their encounter forces Percy to confront two empusai, leading to a daring escape. Upon returning to Camp Half-Blood, Percy discovers that his friend Grover is under scrutiny by the Council of Cloven Elders. Meanwhile, Percy and Annabeth Chase discover an entrance to the Labyrinth, a potential invasion route. The fifth book that should be read is The Demigod Files, a companion book.
