El año 2025 tendrá doce días que serán festivos en España, de los cuales nueve son comunes a todas las comunidades autónomas, según el calendario laboral elaborado por el Ministerio de Trabajo y publicado este viernes en el Boletín Oficial del Estado (BOE). De estos doce días, ocho son fiestas nacionales no sustituibles: Año Nuevo, Viernes Santo, Fiesta del Trabajo, Asunción de la Virgen, Todos los Santos, Día de la Constitución Española, Inmaculada Concepción y Natividad del Señor. Además de estos ocho festivos, todas las comunidades autónomas celebrarán la Epifanía del Señor (6 de enero), una de las fiestas nacionales que el Estado permite ser sustituida por otra autonómica. Cabe destacar que el año que viene cae en domingo la Fiesta Nacional de España (12 de octubre). De las otras tres jornadas festivas, hasta completar las doce, la mayoría de las regiones, salvo Cataluña y Comunidad Valenciana, ha optado por celebrar también el Jueves Santo, en tanto que el resto de días escogidos está muy repartido a lo largo del calendario. Celebrarán San José (19 de marzo) Murcia y la Comunidad Valenciana, y Santiago Apóstol (25 de julio) Galicia, Madrid, Navarra y País Vasco, en tanto que festejarán el día siguiente a la Fiesta Nacional de España (lunes 13 de octubre) Andalucía, Aragón, Asturias, Castilla y León y Extremadura. El Lunes de Pascua (21 de abril) será festivo en Cataluña, Navarra, País Vasco, La Rioja y Comunidad Valenciana, mientras que Castilla-La Mancha celebrará la fiesta del Corpus Christi (19 de junio) y Cataluña y Comunidad Valenciana, San Juan (24 de junio). En San Esteban (26 de diciembre) no se trabajará en Baleares ni Cataluña. Además, todas las regiones celebrarán sus diferentes festividades autonómicas. It is located on the Maresme coast, to the south of Costa Brava, between Cabrera de Mar and Sant Andreu de Llavaneres, 30 kilometres (19 miles) north-east of Barcelona. As of 2021[update], it had a population of 129,749. Roman villa of Can Llauder. Mataró dates back to Roman times when it was a village known as "Iluro" or "Illuro". The ruins of a first-century BC Roman bath house (known locally as the Torre Llauder) were recently discovered and can be visited. The coastal N-II highway follows the same path as the original Roman road, Via Augusta. Mataró was declared a city by royal decree, even though at the time (nineteenth century) the population fell short of the requirement for city status. The first railway in peninsular Spain was the Mataró – Barcelona line which opened on 28 October 1848 by the Catalan businessman and Mataró native Miquel Biada. This line now forms part of the Renfe/Rodalies de Catalunya R1 suburban service between L'Hospitalet de Llobregat and Maçanet-Massanes. Mataró is also connected with Barcelona and Girona by the C-32 autopista (freeway) and with Granollers by the C-60 autopista. During the 1992 Summer Olympics in Barcelona, Mataró was the starting point for the marathon events.[5] Mataró is the birthplace of the noucentista architect Josep Puig i Cadafalch, who designed the ajuntament (town hall) and several other notable buildings in the town: Casa Coll i Regàs. Casa Parera. Casa Sisternes. El Rengle. Hermitage of St. Simon. La Beneficiència. Mataró City Wall. (was built between 1569 and 1600 and was designed by the military engineer Jorge de Setara. This wall is supposed to follow, to a large extent, the line of the old Roman wall. It was built with small stones bound with lime mortar. The Mataró City Wall had seven large gates, as well as attached towers that gave it greater defence. During the 19th century, many sections of the old Mataró City Wall were demolished.) Nearby the town are the archaeological remains of the Roman villa of Can Llauder. The traditional vineyards were devastated by Phylloxera in the nineteenth century and only partially replanted, due to the growth of the tourist industry and the development of irrigation in the area. Potatoes were one of the first replacement crops to be introduced, especially the Royal Kidney variety, and Mataró obtained a Denominació d'Origen in 1932.[6] Trocadéro lettuce and peas are also grown, mostly for export. The production of cut flowers is less important than in other towns of the Maresme. Irrigated land made up 9.13 square kilometres (3.53 sq mi) of the 10.57 square kilometres (4.08 sq mi) of agricultural land in the municipality in 1986 (47% of the municipal territory). In modern viticulture, the red mourvèdre grape variety is a better-known synonym for the grape known in Spain, the U.S., and Australia as matabla. Mataró, the city, is thought to be the likely origin of matabla, the wine grape. Mataró has a borderline humid subtropical climate (Cfa in Köppen climate classification) bordering with a Hot-summer mediterranean climate, (Köppen Csa). Some of them are also celebrated in the rest of Catalonia and others, which have a religious origin, are part of the folklore and traditions of Spain and some other countries. Among all of them the most popular ones are: The three wise men in Mataró. Carnival in Mataró: celebrated immediately before Lent. Easter in Mataró: celebrated every year during one week on a movable date from the end of March to the very beginning of May Saint George in Mataró: celebrated on 23 April. It is a big celebration although it is not a bank holiday. St. John the Baptist in Mataró: celebrated on 24 June Les Santes: local festivity of the city celebrated at the end of July. It involves the recognition of Saint Juliana and Saint Semproniana. The caga Tió: celebrated in Catalonia on Christmas' Eve, 24 December. Mataró also celebrates several fairs such as: Tres Tombs and Saint Ponç. In May it is celebrated a fair called Mercat de Sant Ponç. At the fair handicraft products, medicinal herbs, natural products like: honey, cheese, fruits, flowers, jam and salami are sold. Sant Ponç is the patron saint of the herbalists and bee keepers. The fair has been done for centuries, when in Spring herbalists took medicine to the sick. Today Sant Ponç fair is celebrated to preserve the antique customs. Festival "Cultural Crossroad". Actress in a Drama Series winner Jodie Foster, Outstanding Lead Actress in a Limited or Anthology Series or Movie winner Ebon Moss-Bachrach, Outstanding Supporting Actor in a Comedy Series winner Billy Crudup, Outstanding Supporting Actor in a Drama Series winner Lamorne Morris, Outstanding Supporting Actor in a Limited or Anthology Series or Movie winner Jessica Gunning, Outstanding Supporting Actress in a Limited or Anthology Series or Movie winner The nominations for the 76th Primetime Emmy Awards were announced on July 17, 2024, in a virtual broadcast originating from the El Capitan Theatre in Hollywood, Los Angeles, hosted by actor Tony Hale, actress Sheryl Lee Ralph and Television Academy chair Cris Abrego.<sup>[3]</sup> Including nominations at the 76th Primetime Creative Arts Emmy Awards, *Shōgun* led all programs with 25 nominations.<sup>[4]</sup> It was also the second non-English language series to be nominated for Outstanding Drama Series after *Squid Game*, which was nominated two years earlier.<sup>[5]</sup> *The Bear* became the most-nominated comedy series for a single season in the awards' history with 23 nominations; the program surpassed the record held by the NBC comedy *30 Rock*, which received 22 nominations in 2009.<sup>[6][7]</sup> Lily Gladstone of the series *Under the Bridge* and Kali Reis of the series *True Detective: Night Country* became the first indigenous American women to receiving acting nominations; along with D'Pharaoh Woon-A-Tai of the series *Reservation Dogs*, they were the first indigenous American actors to earn an acting nomination since August Schellenberg for his role in the television film *Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee* in 2007.<sup>[8]</sup> Netflix led all networks and platforms with 107 nominations. FX came in second place with 93 nominations, surpassing its own record of 56 nominations in 2016.<sup>[9]</sup> The winners were announced on September 15, following the Creative Arts Emmys on September 7 and 8. With 36 total wins, FX led all networks and platforms for the first time.<sup>[10]</sup> *Shōgun* became the first non-English-language series to win Outstanding Drama Series and won a total of 18 awards, breaking the record of 13 set by *John Adams* in 2008 to become the most awarded program for a single year in Emmy history.<sup>[11]</sup> It also passed *Game of Thrones*'s 12 wins in 2015, 2016, and 2019 for most wins.

Shōgun became the first non-English-language series to win Outstanding Drama Series and won a total of 18 awards, breaking the record of 15 set by John Adams in 2008 to become the most awarded program for a single year in Emmy history.<sup>[11]</sup> It also passed Game of Thrones's 12 wins in 2013, 2016, and 2019 for most wins by a drama series in a single season.<sup>[12]</sup> With its 11 wins, The Bear surpassed its own record for most wins for a comedy series in a single year. For their work on Shōgun, Hiroyuki Sanada and Anna Sawai were the first Japanese performers to win Outstanding Lead Actor in a Drama Series and Outstanding Lead Actress in a Drama Series, respectively.<sup>[13][14]</sup> Sawai also became the first Asian to win her category, while Sanada became the second Asian to do so in his category after Lee Jung-jae for his role in Squid Game in 2022.<sup>[15]</sup> Liza Colón-Zayas was the first Latina winner for Outstanding Supporting Actress in a Comedy Series for her performance on The Bear.<sup>[16]</sup> Winners are listed first, highlighted in boldface, and indicated with a double dagger (‡).<sup>[17]</sup><sup>[18]</sup>[a] For simplicity, producers who received nominations for program awards have been omitted.
