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## Got grievances worksheet answer key icivics

Just remember to use a long arrow pointing to the right and include each event based on when it occurred. We've also included a list of events and their dates to help you out. Now, let's talk about the rights that our colonists believed in. They thought they came from two sources: natural rights that all people are born with, and English rights protected by law and shared by all British people. By reading through these sources and grievances, you'll be able to decide if each grievance is an abuse of a natural right or an English right. Finally, the colonists boycotted British tea when they were forced to pay a tax for it without their consent. We've got some information on how effective this boycott was, including in what years American colonies imported the most and least amount of tea. Given the numbers in the chart, one may wonder if the colonial boycott on imported British tea was an effective form of protest. To answer this question, it's essential to note that the decline in tea imports around the time of the Townshend Acts and the Boston Tea Party suggests a connection between these events. Imagine being a citizen of Boston, Massachusetts in 1774, with your father recently departing for Philadelphia to attend the Continental Congress. Writing a letter to your cousin in Virginia could be a thought-provoking exercise. The letter would likely express concerns about British policies and how they're affecting the colonies. In the Declaration of Independence, it's stated that people have unalienable rights including life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. These rights come from their Creator, and governments are established to secure them. If a government becomes destructive, the people have the right to alter or abolish it and establish a new one. A petition for freedom submitted to the Massachusetts Legislature mentions being denied natural rights and having the right to freedom bestowed by the Great Parent of the Universe. The petitioners feel their capture from their own country violates laws of nature because they never forfeited their right to freedom through any compact or agreement.
