Time Expressions with Reported Speech Sometimes when we change direct speech into reported speech we have to change time expressions too. Occasionally, we don't need to change the present tense into the past if the information in direct speech is still true (but this is only for things which are general facts, and even then usually we like to change the tense): Direct speech: The sky is blue. past perfect* I had taken English lessons before She said (that) she had taken English lessons before.
