between eight and twelve weeks; professional animal trainers and the American Kennel Club advise puppies should be introduced to "100 People by 12 Weeks" and have encountered a wide and varied selection of people and environments.[11]The practice of docking began primarily as a preventive measure for injury among working dogs. Docking is
now primarily performed for purely cosmetic reasons, and some breeds traditionally have their tails cropped anywhere from slightly to almost entirely.[12] Many countries now ban cropping and docking for cosmetic purposes, including Australia, parts of Canada, the majority of the European countries (Austria, Greece, Finland, Netherlands, Italy, the
Czech Republic, Turkey, Poland, Slovakia, England, Scotland, Slovenia, Ireland, Norway and Sweden), while others, such as the United States, permit it. As of 2008, the practice is opposed by the American Veterinary Medical Association.[13] Some breeders also prefer to declaw the dogs to prevent future injuries caused by scratching, or in the case

The growth plates are especially prone to wear and tear, with strenuous and high impact exercise both culprits for causing stress to
these areas. Large breed dogs are particularly vulnerable, as they are growing very fast and have more weight on their joints. The ideas of limiting exercise have come about in an effort to protect puppies from early and unnecessary joint diseases such as arthritis. Not at all! Getting out for walks is vital for puppies, for many reasons. Exercise is
necessary to develop strong muscle tone. A lack of exercise can actually be more problematic for developing limbs than too much! Puppies can start to play and exercise as soon as they can walk, but their joints and limbs wont be mature until they are around 12-18 months of age, dependent on breed. Development of social skills and normal
behaviours is also happening rapidly in puppies and young dogs, and getting out and about is hugely important to prevent behavioural issues. Being cooped up inside also leads to frustration which commonly spells furniture destruction or worse! As long as the exercise amount is sensible, walks are definitely a good thing. question! There are many suggested regimes out there, which vary widely. There is actually very little true evidence on this subject, with nothing proving that excess exercise amounts of five minutes daily or twice daily, per

puppy stimulated and engaged without stressing their joints. Play is hugely important to puppies, and doesnt have to involve running and chasing. Think about tug-of-war games, treasure hunts for hidden treats and basic training such as learning to sit or lie down on command. Remember to let your puppy rest when they seem tired. out for some fun walks is fine, as long as common sense is applied. example, an 8-week-old puppy can walk for 10 minutes a day. A 12-week-old puppy can walk for 15 minutes a day. I do not believe in follow the above equation, then a 6 month
old puppy would only be walking 30 minutes per day. Thats a good amount for some breeds, but not an active breed like a weimaraner. Following the above puppy walking schedule. Instead, use common sense based on the puppy in front of you. They are all
so different depending on breed, size and personality. My puppy on a walk I have a Weimaraner puppy, and this dog would be at the humane society by now if I had to follow that silly puppy walking equation. Instead, I believe in using common sense and taking your puppy for short walks 20 to 30 minutes or so, twice per day if he seems comfortable.

Remys parents are working, competitive bird dogs. Weimaraners are fit and lean. They run all day in the field. They are designed for endurance!
Theres no way I could live with a working weimaraner puppy if I could only walk him 20 minutes or so (around 1.6 miles for us) is my way of limiting his exercise to 35-minute walks or so.

They are the experts and can give you the best advice. It also doesn't hurt to talk with more than one vet as veterinarians dont seem to have

What it comes down to is you know your puppy better than anyone else. Dog owners mean well and sometimes people feel the need to share their very strong opinions about not to walk

The real risk for this depends highly on where you live, so its best to get your local vets opinion on this. For example, my puppy grew up in a nice
neighborhood near San Diego and our vet said there was very little risk of our puppy getting sick as nearly all dogs in our area were vaccinated and leashed. So I was comfortable taking my dog for neighborhood walks but I waited on the dog park and dog beach until he was fully vaccinated. Some breeds are more prone to joint issues than others. For
example, we got a Lab puppy in 2021, and our breeder recommended we do not run with our Lab until he is fully matured. Walks, however, would be OK. Sophie the springer spaniel puppy at 8 weeks My plan is to take it a little more cautious with our Lab vs. our weimaraner because Labs are a bit bulkier and prone to joint problems. My Lab is also
waaaaay less energetic than my weimaraner. My Lab pup is about 5 months old now and we head out for two 1-mile walks per day. If we go hiking once a week, he can handle about 4 miles but hes tired afterwards. Genetics are a factor for predicting whether or not a pup will develop hip dysplasia. It is more important to go through a
good breeder that does genetic testing than it is to reduce a puppys exercise. Other factors include weight, overall health and diet. Overweight dogs and puppies at 8 weeks old. There are many studies now that say puppies that are spayed or neutered that
young are much more likely to tear their ACLs down the road and develop all sorts of health problems. For this reason, I did not have my weimaraner puppy neutered until he was 10 months old. I do not plan to neuter our Lab, but if I do I will try to wait until he is at least 18 months old and close to being physically mature. Heres another article on the
effects of early spay/neuter. However, if your puppy is already spayed or neutered, do not worry. Rescues and shelters typically spay or neuter puppies as young as 8 weeks old, for example. Remy If you took your puppy on a long walk or hike before reading this, dont worry. Your puppy was able to keep up on a long will most likely be just fine! Even if you took your puppy was running at the beach all day or if your puppy was able to keep up on a long hike
with the adult dogs. Just use common sense from here on out. Like Ive said several times, a good rule of thumb is to shoot for about 30 minutes of walking, you should follow the same approach as you would with walking. Plan on
hiking slowly and turning around before youd like. Carry your puppy if he gets tired! Generally, your puppy is different, though! My 4 month old puppy on a walk Its also a good idea to check with your vet about
what vaccinations are a good idea in your area before taking your puppy on trails. Each area is different depending on dog traffic, wildlife, etc. See our post: Should I walk my puppy before hes had his vaccinations? Its OK to start training your puppy to walk on a leash right away from when you bring your puppy home. I recommend you use a
light/thin nylon leash so it is not too heavy for your puppy. Most likely, if you start walking, your puppy will follow you. Reward her with treats and praise. If your puppy is already starting to pull you, here are my tips for loose-leash walking. With your vets approval, I would begin right away! I took both my 8-week-old puppies for 20-minute walks
through our neighborhood right away. The only reason you might want to wait on walking your puppy in the neighborhood is if your puppy still needs some vaccinations. This is only the case if there is a higher risk of parvo or distemper in your area. In many parts of the United States, the risk is so small that its silly to avoid neighborhood walks. In
other areas, the risk is higher so you might decide its better to wait until your puppys final round of shots around 4 months old. Again, its all about making the best choice for your specific situation! This is a good question for your vet. Generally, its safe to introduce your puppy to adult dogs that are vaccinated. If you have friends with calm, friendly
dogs its great to start socializing your puppy right away. Its also a great idea to sign your puppy up for a puppy kindergarten class. This is a great way to work on training and socialization at the same time. My puppy with my adult dog As far as dog parks go, I personally prefer to keep my puppies away from dog parks for at
least the first 6 months. Dog parks are not necessarily bad for puppies but they can be very overwhelming and you have little control of the other dogs behavior. I do not want to scare my puppy during this important socialization window. I would rather set up smaller playdate with appropriate dogs. However, you might think about taking your puppy
to a dog park during the middle of the day during the meek or late in the morning when it is quieter. Socializing with one or two friendly dogs might be a positive experience for your puppy is scared or overwhelmed. OK, enough from me! Id like to hear your take on puppy exercise. forms of exercises, helping them to build up muscles, strengthen joints and learn how to be social and interact with others. Puppies tend to self-limit play, and will sleep a lot, but its important that they get that the opportunity to play and rest when they need to. Formal exercise Puppies need less formal exercise than fully grown dogs. Taking them for
long walks while theyre young can overtire them. Youll know your dog best, and the amount of exercise a dog can manage will vary between breeds and dogs, but a good rule of thumb is a ratio of five minutes of formal exercise per month of age (up to twice a day) when three months
old, 20 minutes when four months old and so on. As they become frustrated and bored if they dont get enough exercise, so its important that they go out for exercise every day. Formal exercise away from their normal environment
gives them different environments to explore and is a great way to provide them with mental stimulation. Time and play spent in your garden should be encouraged, but its no substitute for going out for a walk and exploring new environments or socialising with other dogs. Make sure your puppy is trained to return to you when you call their name to
help keep them safe and secure when you need to. Risks to joints from heights or being taught to jumpAvoid exercise that that puppies: Avoid high impact exercise, such as jumping from heights or being taught to jumpAvoid exercise that
involves sharp sudden turns, such as chasing a ball. Never throw sticks for any dogs as they can splinter, wound or impale a dog when picked up in their mouthAvoid using the stairs until at least 12 weeks old, but this may be longer for some larger breedsStay a healthy weight, as overweight puppies have an increased risk of joint disease as they
matureIts also important to never exercise your puppy on a full stomach, as this can contribute to a life-threatening health issue known as bloat. If in doubt, your breeder, breed club or vet will also be able to offer support and advice about the best ways to exercise your puppy. For a new puppy who is about 8 weeks old, keep walks to 5 or 10 minutes.
Let your puppy choose the speed, and take breaks as needed. If she is tired and doesnt want to walk, carry her home. As your puppy gets older, she can gradually take longer walks. A 12-week-old puppy can walk about 15 to 20 minutes. Again, allow your puppy to choose the speed and take plenty of breaks for sniffing. Avoid trying to pull the
puppy. Puppies are still developing their muscles and bones, so long walks can be too hard on their bodies. If you must walk on pavement, keep walks shorter. Walks on grass or dirt are easier on your puppys growing bones than pavement, keep walks shorter.
45 to 60 minutes as your puppy reaches 6 or 7 months of age. Hold off on true hikes or long purposeful walks on pavement until your puppy bones are still growing. She will become physically mature at around 12 months of age for small dogs and around 18 to 24 months for larger
