



If establishment Black male writers cannot see that Barbara Smith and Cheryl Clarke and Pat Parker and I are sisters in struggle, and that we fight on the same side, then the question is, 'what are we fighting for?'" Indeed. This New York-bred daughter of Afro--Caribbean immigrants loomed large as rebel, lesbian, mother, political activist, teacher, poet, cancer survivor and author of 16 books of poetry and prose. And if you survive you survive because those skills and defences have worked. For me, reading it as a window into her writing, I was very frustrated. Lorde moved in amazing ways through strange days and changing times, bringing her joy, anger and fearlessness to bear in poems and prose that continue to intrigue, inspire and enrage (some folk) to this day. She was also a rebellious child of Caribbean parents, a mastectomy patient, a blue-collar worker, a college professor, a student of African mythology, an experimental autobiographer in her book titled Zami, a critic of imperialism, and a charismatic orator.
