Philadelphia eagles open practice

Single-game tickets for all Philadelphia Eagles home games will go on sale Tuesday, June 13, at 10 AM ET, with a four-ticket limit per household. Fans can purchase tickets by visiting Ticketmaster.com and are encouraged to act quickly due to high demand. Additionally, public practice general admission tickets for the team's Training Camp event at Lincoln Financial Field on August 6 will also go on sale Tuesday, June 13, starting at 10 AM ET. VIP tickets offering an exclusive on-field experience before practice can be purchased for \$35, with all proceeds benefiting the Eagles Autism Foundation. Seating will be first-come, first-served, and all individuals over age two require a ticket for entry. . Parking will be free. The Eagles have made significant roster moves during the NFL draft, but the team's offseason landscape remains uncertain. The 2026 NFL offseason will see 29 players test restricted or unrestricted free agency, including Jalen Carter and Dallas Goedert. Key factors include the pending contract extension for Carter and the status of star tight end Goedert. Reed Blankenship is a notable name on the list, with Nakobe Dean's final year of his rookie deal looming. VanSumeren's season ended due to a knee injury suffered during practice. He has carved out roles as fullback, reserve linebacker, and special-teams standout. Cine, a 24-year-old from Haiti listed at 6-foot-2 and 199 pounds, is a low-risk signing after a decorated college career at Georgia. Ricks poised for elevation in the Eagles' depth chart after a year of growth and learning. His young age (23) and length make him an attractive trade target. Green, entering his last year on a \$2.88 million deal, saw limited playing time as a rookie but was underwhelming last season. Dillon, recovering from a neck injury, signed a one-year contract. Dean, who earned All-Pro votes, will rehab from a torn patellar tendon and may miss part of the 2025 season. Calcaterra excelled with career highs in catches, yards, and touchdowns. Goedert's departure could benefit him most; the tight end is entering his final year on a \$11.81 million salary cap hit. Goedert has been a top tight end when healthy but may be nearing an exit strategy. Dotson had his fifth-year option declined, while Blankenship earned a one-year extension and could be in line for more substantial deals next season. Fans gathered at Lincoln Financial Field in South Philadelphia for the Philadelphia Eagles' annual open practice, a highly anticipated event that signals the start of football season. Despite the sweltering heat wave, enthusiasts braved the temperatures to catch a glimpse of their favorite team before the preseason begins. For some, like Brooke Williams, it's a chance to create lifelong memories with family members, such as her 8-year-old son Brandon, who was thrilled to see Saquon Barkley take the field. Others, like Eric Husosky, use the event to get hyped for the upcoming season. Meanwhile, others found solace in the practice as a way to cope with personal struggles, such as Anyanwu Carter, who spent the evening with his brother after their father's passing. As the clock ticks down to the Eagles' season opener on August 9, fans like Carter Brown are eagerly anticipating the chance to cheer on their favorite team. Tonight's open practice at Lincoln Financial Field is the only scheduled public event of its kind during training camp, with proceeds benefiting the Eagles Autism Foundation. Fans can catch Eagles open practice at 4:30 p.m. with weather permitting and bring one unopened bottle of water weighing 20 ounces or less due to the hot forecasted weather. Tickets are available on Ticketmaster for \$10, plus fees, and require a ticket for those over 2 years old. Parking is free, but proceeds will go towards the Eagles Autism Foundation. The Philadelphia Eagles Pro Shop will be open from extended hours during practice, allowing fans to buy Kelly Green merchandise. Fans can meet Eagles Legends during practice for autographs and photos, including former players Hugh Douglas and Jason Avant. Additionally, there's a dunk tank fundraiser on Pepsi Plaza where fans can dunk Jason Avant between 5-7 PM, benefiting the Eagles Autism Foundation. The Eagles' training camp felt like a game-day atmosphere, from the tailgating in the parking lot, many wearing green to show off their eagles pride -- to the huge crowd inside the stadium. An estimated 50,000 fans came out to watch the Eagles practice. "We try to come out, we go to every tailgate and it's just amazing to see the energy." Fans got pumped for practice by singing the Eagles Fight Song. Then they roared with excitement for each player who walked onto the field. "I definitely want to see Jalen Hurts throwing perfect passes to A.J. Brown, DeVonta Smith, and uh, can't forget about them autographs," Juan Maldonado said. "That's our goal." Fans say they've been waiting all summer to watch the Eagles work out. "We love preseason, getting ready," Shannon said. "Hopefully, have another exciting season like last year." It was a tough loss last year in the Super Bowl, but fans say the team is rebounding and they're excited to see the players' growth. Gonzalez has an idea The Philadelphia Eagles are gearing up for their preseason training camp, and fans are buzzing with excitement. A public practice was held today at Lincoln Financial Field, where quarterback Jalen Hurts made a triumphant return. The team is looking forward to their first preseason game against the Baltimore Ravens on Saturday night. Meanwhile, an inspiring story emerged as Jovonna Townsend brought her 7-year-old son Asher, who was born prematurely and given a slim chance of survival, to watch the practice. To get to Lincoln Financial Field by car, follow these directions depending on your location: **From Scranton, Wilkes-Barre, Allentown, Bethlehem, Quakertown** 1. Take the Pennsylvania Turnpike Northeast Extension (I-476) south. 2. Cross over the Pennsylvania Turnpike (I-276) and remain on I-476 south (now the Blue Route). 3. On I-476 take Exit 16 (formerly Exit 6) and follow I-76 east all the way through Philadelphia. 4. Use Exit 349, Sports Complex exit (formerly Exit 45). Make a right off the exit onto Broad Street. **From Eastern Montgomery County** 1. Take Route 611 (Easton Road, Old York Road) south. 2. As you near Philadelphia, signs change from Route 611 to Broad Street. Continue on Broad Street and make a right onto the Roosevelt Expressway (Route 1) south. 3. Follow the Roosevelt Expressway to the Schuylkill Expressway (I-76) east all the way through Philadelphia. Use Exit 349, Sports Complex exit (formerly Exit 45). Make a right off the exit onto Broad Street. **From South Jersey** 1. Take the Walt Whitman Bridge. 2. After crossing bridge into Philadelphia, take Broad Street, Exit 349 (formerly Exit 45). 3. Make a left onto Broad Street as you come off the exit. **By Public Transportation** The quickest way to Lincoln Financial Field is south along the SEPTA Broad Street Subway Line. Exit at the last southbound stop, Pattison Avenue. You can also take other public transportation options such as buses and trains from various locations. For more information on how to get to Lincoln Financial Field by public transportation, see below. * From Center City, North Philadelphia, South Philadelphia Take the SEPTA Broad Street Subway Line south to Pattison Avenue. South Philadelphia alternative: Route 4 bus southbound to Broad Street. * From West Philadelphia Take the Market-Frankford Line east to 15th Street Station, transfer to the Broad Street Line southbound to Pattison Avenue (no charge for transfer at 15th street). * From Suburbs - via train Take Regional Rail train to Suburban Station (16th & JFK), walk through concourse to City Hall Station, transfer to Broad Street Line southbound to Pattison Avenue. * From Nearby Western Suburbs - via bus or trolley Take a suburban bus or trolley route to 69th Street Terminal, transfer to eastbound Market-Frankford Line, ride to 15th Street Station, transfer to Broad Street Line southbound to Pattison Avenue. * From PATCO High-Speed Line (originating in Lindenwold, NJ) Take PATCO High-Speed line west to 12th/13th Walnut Street Station, connect with the SEPTA Subway System. Broad St line southbound at Walnut-Locust Station. Exit at Pattison Ave and ask for round-trip ticket at PATCO Station that covers both lines. Ask about last trains after night games. No SEPTA trains after midnight, shuttle buses on Broad St instead.
