

Inserting Accented Characters with an English Keyboard Layout If you only need an accented character every now and then, there is no need to change your full keyboard layout. For all PCs There are several key combinations you can use to insert single characters into your text on a PC. The first is for newer computers using the Control key and may only work in Microsoft Office. In Office for Windows: For accented vowels: Press Ctrl + , then the vowel (ctrl + , + a =) For : Press Ctrl + ~, then the letter n (ctrl + ~ + n =) The second way is using the ASCII code. For all Macs To get accented vowels on a Mac, hold down the Option key, and while holding it down, type the letter e; then release those keys and type the letter that you want the accent to appear on. Opt + 1 = Opt + shift + ? = Full Keyboard Configuration For those using Spanish letters and punctuation on a regular basis, I recommend going into your Control Panel/System Preferences and add the Spanish keyboard configuration. This will mean you need to learn the new key placements, but it is very easy once you get used to it. For Windows Vista Go to your Control Panel Click on "Clock, Language, Region Click on "Change Keyboards" Click "Add" and Select "Spanish-International Sort" For Windows XP: Go to your Control Panel Click on "Date, Time, Language, and Regional Options" Click on "Regional and Language Options" Select the "Languages" tab at the top Click on "Details" near the bottom Click "Add" and choose "Spanish-Traditional Sort" Go back to the "Languages" tab and choose the option to "switch languages" by pressing "left alt-shift" at the same time. This way, you can switch to and from the Spanish and regular keyboard whenever you want. First, you will notice that when you type an apostrophe ('), nothing happens. This is because if you type a vowel immediately after, you will get an accented vowel (, , , , , , ,). To get an apostrophe, push the key for the hyphen, next to the number 0. You can see several other changes in the picture below. The quotes (") key behaves the same way as the apostrophe key in that it gives you the unmlaut () rather than quotes for the letter () in words like "lingstica". To type in regular quotes, simply press shift then the number 2. The semicolon (;) key has also been replaced by the . To type a regular semicolon, simply press shift then the comma key. alt textIn Spanish, there are four main ways to talk about a future action. Things Happening in the Near FutureThe Spanish present tense can also be used to talk about things that will happen in the near future. examplesVoy al parque. Vienes?I'm going to the park. Timeless Events/Universal TruthsThings that are universally known or generally accepted are often expressed using the simple present. Lapses of TimeThe present tense is commonly used to talk about the amount of time something has been going on. The following formula is used with the present tense for this purpose. examplesHace tres aos que esperamos tu llamada.We've been waiting three years for your call.Hace una semana que pinta este cuadro.He's been painting this painting for a week.7. OrderingInIt's also quite common to use the present tense in Spanish when ordering something in a restaurant or store.examplesMe trae un caf, por favor?Would you bring me a coffee, please?Quiero el arroz con pollo.I would like the chicken and rice.
