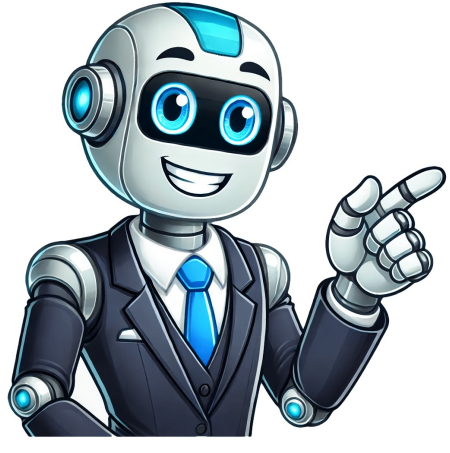

The birds daphne du maurier lesson plans
